FIGHTING WITH COURAGE AND HUMILITY

The Covid-19 pandemic has reached over 200 countries, has affected over 16.3 million people, has claimed over six lakh lives, has reached 21 Indian states, afflicted over 14 lakh Indians,

and, the numbers are still rising. After months of lockdowns, several countries have begun reopening, and, India, too, has exited an unprecedented 98-day shutdown. The outbreak, however, continues to strain our resources compelling organisations to recalibrate. While it may take time for the new realities to sink in, the magnanimity displayed by Afconians during the pandemic has been reassuring. Stories of

courage and sacrifice have been instrumental in shaking off fears of the virus and encouraging us to look beyond ourselves.

Over the past months, Afconians have selflessly worked for local communities in the fight against Covid-19. As is the culture of the organisation, employees have displayed an “inclusive” approach and haven’t hesitated to jump into the frontline. Notwithstanding the perils of the virus, they have volunteered to help frontline workers, people in Covid-affected zones, poor families, stranded migrants, villagers in the interiors etc. This solidarity has earned respect from government bodies, district administrations across geographies.

happy and overwhelmed by the support from Afcons during this terrible health crisis. The team has proactively come forward in support. They have assisted us with Covid-19 relief items which we have passed on to different sections of the society. They have individually helped over 5,000 families with food and sanitation items. I appreciate their kind gesture and urge them to continue this benevolence,” said Zambian Minister of Local Government, Hon Charles Romel Banda.

Afcons has received similar appreciation from the Royal Government of Bhutan, Ministry of Railways Development, Ghana, and various district administration authorities, in India, as a mark of respect to our Covid Warriors.

Sharing is Caring

The pandemic unleashed unforeseen human miseries. To alleviate their suffering, Afconians hit the roads with supplies of ration, food, sanitation material, and, face masks for local communities and Covid warriors. Aid was extended to communities across Asia and Africa to help them in these trying times. Besides providing a month’s ration to over 5,000 villagers, the Nagpur-Mumbai Super Communication Expressway Project (Package

2) team supported temporary shelters at Wardha by providing meals to those stranded due to lockdown, provided drinking water to villagers etc. Similarly, Package 14 team from the same project donated 700 litres of cooking oil to residents of Igatpuri. Along with sanitation products, grocery items and non-contact thermometers, the USBRL Bridges project team, in J&K, arranged a six-bed quarantine facility in Reasi.

Similar efforts were carried out by project sites across Africa and other parts of Asia.

Beyond Borders

In neighbouring Bangladesh, Afcons-KPTL DTJ project team stood by Bangladesh Railway by providing face masks, gloves and sanitation items. As soon as they were notified about a local orphanage struggling to arrange food for children, the team arranged groceries for a month.

In Ghana, Afconians came to the aid of 500 underprivileged families in the region by sharing grocery and personal hygiene kits. Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) kits were also donated amongst health officials.

In Zambia, our project team executed a significant donation drive by sharing essentials among 5,000 local communities. The

team has, so far, donated ration and sanitation products across several constituencies in Lusaka. They have also extended support to local schools and organisations that help the needy. The team has also distributed handwash, face masks and gloves in various ministries.

In Mauritania, the project team donated grocery items and sanitisers to the Mayor’s Office for distribution among locals in Covid-19-affected areas.

In Ivory Coast, grocery items were provided to over 200 families to help them in the pandemic.

Afcons is changing the landscape of Lusaka and Zambia with its engineering capabilities that bring value for money. Afcons is not only delivering quality infrastructure to Zambia but has also responded effectively to the Government’s response against the Covid-19 pandemic through workplace-based interventions and community support in the fight against Covid-19

AFCONS PROVIDED A MONTH'S RATION TO OVER 5,000 VILLAGERS IN WARDHA

The police personnel who were on the frontline, too, were provided with necessary support. In Kolkata, apart from providing food to the needy during lockdown, the team arranged for sanitation of local police booths, offices and barracks. The Chhara Breakwater team distributed ration kits to local police personnel. The Nagpur Metro team made sure the on-duty police personnel received lunch boxes and water for majority of the lockdown period.

Supporting Families

The pandemic resulted in several families of daily wage earners losing their livelihood. The Nagpur-Mumbai Super Communication Expressway Project (Package 2) team supported a local women's group by placing order for face

masks and then purchasing them for distribution among locals. The Nagpur Metro team, too, provided support to local women tailors by ordering 2,000 face masks and subsequently distributing them among the underprivileged. The team also identified over 100 poor families with elderly people and distributed grocery items.

Infrastructure Support

Bhutan has shone in its efforts to contain the pandemic. Afcons is executing the Phuentsholing Township Development Project in the country. Even before the virus could start spreading in the border towns, the team stepped into action. At the India-Bhutan border along Amo Chhu river, wired fencing of 120m was erected to prevent the entry of unauthorised persons. Afconians worked along with the Royal Bhutan Army to build emergency housing shelters for those evacuated from the borders.

Always Together

As a token of support, Afconians made voluntary salary contributions, and, an equal amount was contributed by the organisation towards donation to the Covid-19 Fund. The war against Covid-19 is real and all-encompassing. The only way we can win is by standing together and supporting each other. Afcons is determined to overcome this crisis with courage and humility.

The challenges we face are enormous

Few things have intrigued mankind and have caused widespread devastation like the Covid-19 pandemic. It is phenomenal how swiftly the virus triggered panic and destruction inflicting pain on humans globally. THE ART OF LEARNING





Afcons, a change agent in Tanzania

Afcons has been a change agent in partially transforming Tanzania's water woes by executing the Extension of Lake Victoria Water Supply Project. With the commissioning of this project, over 600 km area comprising towns of Tabora, Nzega and Iguanga now receive enough water from Lake Victoria.

Afconians, in the project, experienced how lack of access to clean water can set a region back in unimaginable ways. The miseries they witnessed were unthinkable. People, desperate to meet their daily needs, would collect water from ditches, potholes, and springs. Little children, too, would be seen carrying huge water cans and going from place to place to fill water. "This used to be their lives. Half of their time would be spent just trying to gather some potable water," recounted Dhaval Soni, Project Manager of Extension

of Lake Victoria Water Supply Project.

The project involved laying a complex network of water pipelines spread across 603 kms, including, five Ground Water Reservoirs (GSR), five Elevated Service Reservoirs (ESR) and 303 water kiosks. Each kiosk is located between clusters of 10 to 20 houses, catering to 100 to 200 villagers. At present, around 60,000 locals are benefitting from the project, with the numbers expected to rise to around 3 lakh by 2035.

"Today, people from several villages are getting clean water right at their doorstep. They are now being able to focus on the basics such as improving personal hygiene and taking up gainful employment,



something that seemed impossible two years ago," said Soni.

Since this was Afcons' first overseas water project, all the experiences that came with it were entirely new for the team. Working in a remote location, and on a project with a strong developmental element, had its own challenges. "Procurement was our

biggest challenge," said Soni, adding, "The remote location made it even tougher. Every day was a new experience throughout the project life cycle. We learnt and unlearned a lot of things, which will make a huge difference in the way we execute upcoming projects in this region."
